

# A Study of the Recreational Resource Benefits of Developing Ecotourism in Tropical Islands

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## EDITORIAL NOTE

With the increasing rise of the tourism business, issues of environmental repercussions in the touring process emerge, such as traffic jams, over-exploitation of natural resources, and issues caused by improper tourist behaviour. As a result, how to ensure that the tourism business develops under the principle of sustainable operation while also assisting in the protection of the environmental ecological system, as well as to consider carrying out vital environmental protection duties such as species diversity and climate change, in the notion of a sustainable development of tourist resources and a reduction of recreation impacts

The "1st World Islands Conference," which was held in Victoria Island, Canada in 1986 and focused on the research and discussion of mutual environmental challenges and development solutions of island countries and areas, has piqued interest in recent years due to the rapid expansion of island tourism. Meanwhile, specialists and academics concerned with the development of islands around the world are encouraged to pursue relevant research. Because of the sensitivity of the island's ecological environment, as well as traffic, land, economic patterns, ethnic group cultures, and other restrictions, The growth of island tourism should be handled holistically, with planning taking into account the environment, economic, and society at the same time. Lanyu encompasses a distinctive physical terrain and abundant ecological resources as a result of its geographic location, as well as indigenous people's cultural assets.

It is well suited for development as the "Tropical Island Ecotourism" basis. Ecotourism is defined as the use of ecological approaches to integrate people's demand and environmental values with the goal of avoiding depleting natural resources, benefitting local inhabitants' economies, and increasing tourists' recreational experiences. It is a type of recreation method that combines natural ecology and tourism activities, and it is a recreational resource.

According to World Tourist Organization figures, the world tourism industry is rising at a pace of 4% per year, with nature-oriented tourism experiencing a high development of 10% to 30% per year. The United Nations designated 2002 as the International Year of Ecotourism, and Taiwan declared it the "Year of Taiwan Ecotourism," pushing Taiwan ecotourism activities aggressively. As a result, the government's future tourism development strategy will be "ecotourism."

Faced with indigenous tribes' hopes to promote their future vitality through ecotourism development, converting external tourist resources into the power of enabling tribes to develop sustainably requires careful planning and supportive community aid measures. so as to mitigate and minimise the harmful effects of tourism activities A topic worth debating is how to build an ecotourist operating model by Yami people's independent management based on the principles of sustainable development of environment, economy, and society.

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
